

# MAG has never been in better shape!



MAG held its Annual Group Conference in the small town of Manea (pronounced "*may-nee*" not *mania*, as I discovered) in Cambridgeshire, over the weekend of 29th September- 1st October, 2017. The wellattended event demonstrated the confidence and momentum that has been building up in the group over the last few years.

Selina Lavender, who was re-elected unanimously as MAG's Chair, said "the AGC's mood and determination to maintain the gains in terms of influence and action underline the confidence of the movement in promoting riders' rights locally, nationally and internationally. When we reviewed the extent to which the riding community has engaged with local authorities, ministers and other key bodies such as Highways England, it's impossible to ignore the strides we've taken over the last few years". So, what's next on MAG's agenda? Selina continued: "One target for us now is to continue attracting new members. The dramatic rise in membership across London shows it's very possible to achieve this, and we just need to get the message across that signing up is an act of self-interest, to protect your own rights as a rider."

The AGC also heard Dr Leon Mannings' announcement to retire from his role as Policy & Campaigns Advisor after seven years. In an emotive speech, he shared his belief that 'direct action' may be increasingly required to get traction with some more resistant authorities. He also observed that he'd never seen the organisation in better shape.

"The next step is planning the year ahead to continue with no major course corrections," adds Selina.

"We're doing it right and we're doing it well, and we don't need to make alterations to a winning formula. Leon's departure brings on changes, and we're considering how best to evolve our structure to get the most out of what we spend and how we spend it. There's a lot to campaign on, and we know that crime problems, limits to road space and the pollution agenda will all feature in this. We expect a lot from ourselves in 2018 because we have a lot of people to represent, and a clear agenda. It's looking good and I'm delighted to continue as Chair during such a productive time in the movement's history."

# Warning: The value of your investment may go down as well as up.

"I wish I'd bought that Panther 25 years ago but I'm not paying those silly prices now!" I've lost count of the number of times I've heard something like that said. Sadly, I'm afraid, many of us have simply missed the boat for a cheap classic. However, an old friend of mine recently shared an interesting theory with me: the price of classic motorcycles, which has risen so much in the last few years, is set for a fall. This won't happen in the near future but gradually over the next couple of decades, probably through prices stagnating and being eaten away by inflation. As you can imagine I was sceptical. Classic bikes seem to have been a sound investment for years

now, surely they will only go up? Well, this is the way he looks at it.

At 16 he started an apprenticeship at British Aerospace. Britain was still very much a manufacturing nation and most of the lads he went to school with ended up in similar "spannering" trades. Now, like many of that generation, they understand engineering principles are all confident working with their hands. Maintaining a quirky, often unreliable old bike is no problem to them; in fact it's fun. His two sons however work in admin and have zero training in mechanics. Modern vehicles require little maintenance, which is just as well as they wouldn't dream of getting their hands dirty anyway. At home, if so much as a lightbulb need changing they have to send for Dad. Were you to suggest to them that they could spend a contented Sunday afternoon stripping down an Amal Monobloc, they'd look at you like you were daft. So, he suggests, as the older generation die off who is going to pay the same sort of money for these old bikes? Of course, there are some blokes out there who will buy them simply as an investment. They may not even be able to ride a bike but will look at them the same way they would view paintings or fine wines – so long as the price goes up they're happy. But a great part of the intrinsic value of a motorcycle is in the experience of riding it. If vanishingly few people are capable of maintaining it to that standard, the resale market will dry up. This is not the environment to encourage rising prices.

As I said, I was sceptical. But a report last month on the classic car market would seem to back him up. Apparently, figures from Coutts Bank suggest that the value of antique vehicles has flatlined or even fallen over the last 12 months. At a classic car auction at Sotherby's almost half of the lots failed to sell (about twice the proportion of a year ago). One expert has claimed that this is linked to the move from the "grease monkey generation" who had the necessary skills to the high-tech generation who are more at home with an iPhone and so favour more modern designs.

Well, the proof of the pudding is in the eating and it'll be interesting to see what happens over the next few years. After all, stuff is only worth what someone is prepared to pay for it.
